


Knights of Columbus Food for Families Program

It's time to move forward with the Free-Throw Challenge. Let's go with Community Service!

By now scheduling of gym time for the Council events should be well under way. But there is still time to do so if you haven't already done it. As always, Council contests should be in the December/January timeframe, District level is in February and DDs should make sure that they have the District medals for their events.



Here are a couple updates on the Free-Throw Challenge that you should be aware of:

• **Do not use the old two-sided participant forms**. Click on this link for the <u>1598 score sheet</u> that you should be using. They should also be included in the new Free-Throw kits if you order one.

- Make sure that you are up-to-date on the program and rules.
- Free-Throw Championship Playbook Here are a few important ones:
 - Age is determined as of January 1, 2025 NOT their age when your event is held.
 - Council Level participants shoot 15 baskets
 - District Level and above participants shoot 25 baskets
 - Ties at all levels must be broken.
 - To break a tie, contestants take a second round of five free throws. No warm-up tosses are permitted for the tie-breaker rounds. Successive rounds of five free throws each continue until a winner emerges.

• Rules for proof of age/gender: "Paperwork that determines age eligibility of participants **should not be collected or copied.**" So, have them bring and show proof, but **do not make or attach copies of birth certificates or passports to the score sheets**. You can simply note on the score sheet that their eligibility has been verified.

Note: I have verified with our State Advocate, State Deputy and the Director at Supreme for the Free-Throw Championship that we still use the information on the Birth Certificate.

Supplies are available through Supplies Online: Free Throw Kit (FT-KIT-E) Free-Throw participant patches (FT-P-E). You can get 25 patches for \$15.25 District Deputies should order Free-Throw Medals if needed

Christmas Traditions around the World.

Every December and in every country on the planet, people celebrate Christmas. There may be caroling, candles, decorated trees, Nativity scenes, candy canes, Advent wreaths, mistletoe, wrapped gifts, social gatherings, gift giving, stockings, poinsettias, Santa Claus or St. Nicholas. The ways of celebrating Christmas are endless because the holiday proclaims the universal desire for peace on earth and goodwill to all. Here are eight Christmas traditions from around the world.

Mexico

At midnight on Christmas Eve in Mexico, festivities are interrupted by the ringing of bells calling families to *La Misa Del Gallo* (The Mass of The Rooster). This service is called the "Mass of the Rooster" because tradition teaches that the only time that a rooster crowed at midnight was on the day that Jesus was born. In Mexico and among Mexican Americans, Christmas celebrations take place on each of the nine nights leading up to Christmas, from Dec.16 to 24. The word posada means "inn" or "lodging" in Spanish. In this tradition, Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem and their search for a place to stay is re-enacted.

During the nine *posada* days, children process on the streets with candles and a board featuring painted clay figures of Mary riding on a donkey, and Joseph. They call at the houses of friends and sing holiday songs. Like Josepha and Mary, children ask for lodging in the house but are told that there is no room in the house and that they must go away. Eventually they are accommodated and welcomed. Inside, the children offer prayers of thanks and then have a party with food and games. The most popular game played at Posada parties is *piñata* which is a decorated paper mache container filled with sweets and hung from the ceiling or tree branch. To play the game, children are blindfolded and take turns hitting the piñata with a stick until it splits open and the sweets fall out. Then the children rush to pick up as many sweets as they can! Evenings end with fireworks. **Greenland**

Because Greenland sits north of the tree line, residents import evergreens from Denmark or they simply bring in a driftwood tree. In either case, they add holiday decorations to the tree. Greenland Inuit villagers visit each other where they drink coffee, eat sweets, and exchange brightly wrapped traditional gifts such as miniature sleds, polished walrus tusks, or sealskin mittens. Their children go from house to house singing carols. Most homes and village centers display a brightly lit star. This is both festive and practical. Greenland is so far north that in winter months the sun doesn't appear, leaving residents in a perpetual midnight so the stars offer some much welcomed light. Greenlanders' Christmas meals include *mattak*, whale skin with a strip of blubber inside. They consider it a delicacy and a special holiday treat.

Venezuela

From Dec.16 – 24 early morning Masses are celebrated. These are called *Misa de Aguinaldo* (early Morning Mass). While not all families are able to attend this daily Mass for the nine days, most families make an effort to participate in as many as possible. In Caracas, the capital and largest city of Venezuela, there is a unique custom of roller-skating to Mass.

Many neighborhoods close the streets to cars until 8 a.m., to protect skating children. Some homes do have Christmas trees, but usually they are artificial as pine and fir evergreens aren't common to Venezuela. More popular than Christmas trees are the presence of Nativity scenes (*Nacimiento*) in homes. Traditional Venezuelan Christmas foods include *hallacas* — a tamale made from a mixture of beef, pork, chicken, capers, raisins, and olives that is wrapped in maize and plantain leaves and tied up with string into a parcel and then boiled or steamed. Venezuelans also enjoy *pan de jamón* — a bread that's made with puff pastry, filled and rolled up with ham, raisins, olives, and bacon.

Armenia

This country is believed to be the first to adopt Christianity as its state religion in 301. The great apostle of Armenia was St. Gregory the Illuminator (257–337). Armenia proclaimed its independence from the Soviet Union on Sept. 23, 1991. The majority of Armenians belong to the Armenian Apostolic Church with 10 percent of the population being Catholic in communion with Rome. Christmas is celebrated on Jan. 6 During the week leading up to Christmas, many Armenian families fast in ways similar to Christians who do so during Lent. Armenia clergy will often fast for 40 days leading up to Christmas. At the beginning of December a large Christmas tree (*Tonatsar*) is put up in Republic Square in Yerevan, the capital of Armenia. Favorite and traditional holiday foods in Armenia include *Anooshaboor* (Armenian Christmas pudding), *Khozee bood* (glazed ham), and dried fruits. Women prepare a variety of sweets because it is customary for family and friends who stop by for a visit during the season.

Ireland

Traditionally, people in Ireland put a tall, thick candle on the sill of the largest window after sunset on Christmas Eve. That candle is left to burn all night symbolizing a welcoming light for Mary and Joseph.Christmas officially begins on December 8th ending on the feast of the Epiphany on Jan. 6. Irish families adorn their homes with lights, tinsel, and a brightly decorated Christmas tree with an angel on top and colorfully wrapped presents beneath. In ancient times, Irish people used holly and ivy to decorate their homes before the Christmas tree was introduced. It was believed the more berries on the holly would mean better fortune in the new year. Today many families still like to display holly in their homes. Holiday foods include a round cake full of caraway seeds. One is traditionally made for each person in the house. It is becoming more common to have a Christmas fruit cake decorated with icing. Traditional Christmas Eve or Christmas Day dinner centers around a roasted turkey. The most popular dessert is a Christmas pudding. **India**

This country is predominantly Hindu with Christians making up less than 3 percent of the population. Nevertheless that percentage translates into 25 million Christians in India. Goa, India's smallest state on the west coast, has the largest population of Christians, approximately 26 percent of that population. Midnight Mass is an important liturgy for Christians in India. Churches in India are decorated with poinsettia flowers and candles for Midnight Mass. Instead of having traditional Christmas trees, a banana or mango tree is decorated or whatever local tree is available. Sometimes people use mango leaves to adorn their homes. In southern India, Christians often display small oil burning clay lamps on the flat roofs of their homes to show their neighbors that

Jesus is the light of the world. Indians love sweets and consume ample amounts during Christmas. Favored sweets include *neureos* (small pastries which are stuffed with dry fruit and coconut and then fried) and *dodol* (like toffee that has coconut and cashews in it). Families carefully prepare many sweets leading up Christmas in order to share them with family, friends, and neighbors. The main Christmas meal is eaten on Christmas Eve and is similar to those in Western countries with roast turkey or chicken.

Ethiopia

According to legend, Christianity came to Ethiopia as the result of a kidnapping. Two Christians named Frumentios and Aidesios — both residents of Tyre — were abducted on the Red Sea and taken to Aksum, Ethiopia's capital at the time. There they became slaves. Because they were highly educated, the two were installed as private tutors to the royal family. They not only taught the king's children mathematics and Greek, but imparted the fundamentals of their Christian faith as well. In the middle of the 4th century, King Ezana decided to be baptized. By 330, Christianity was proclaimed the state religion. Most Ethiopians are part of the Ethiopian Orthodox Church and celebrate Christmas on Jan. 7. Like Armenian Christians, those in Ethiopia do some fasting during the 40 days leading up to Christmas. During this fast time, Ethiopians become vegan, avoiding the eating of meat, dairy, eggs, oil, and wine. Those who are very young, very elderly, or unhealthy may be exempted from the fasting period or they may reduce it. Traditional Christmas foods in Ethiopia include *wat* which is a thick and spicy stew that contains meat, vegetables, and sometimes eggs. Wat is eaten on a plate of *injera* — a flat bread. Pieces of the injera are used as an edible spoon to scoop up the wat. The Christmas celebration is called Ganna. Most Christians attend services on Christmas Day with early Masses beginning at 4 am. Gift giving is not an important aspect of Christmas. Sometimes children might be given a small gift — usually an item of clothing — from their family members.

Finland

Citizens of Finland claim that Santa Claus or Father Christmas resides year round in the northern part of their country in an area called *Lapland*, which is north of the Arctic Circle. Christmas is so popular in Finland that most people try to be at home for Christmas, including fishermen who try to get their boats into the harbor by Dec. 21, St. Thomas' Day. Even animals are included in Christmas festivities with farmers hanging a sheaf of wheat on a tree to be eaten and pecked at by the birds. Nuts and pieces of suet are also hung on trees in bags from the branches. For Finlanders, "joy to the world" means including all beings. Finlanders' main meal is taken on Christmas Eve and includes *lutefish* (salt fish) or pork with mashed potato. Cured salmon is popular and some people also have turkey. Casseroles containing different vegetables including rutabaga and carrot are served. Desert is baked rice pudding/porridge eaten with spiced plum jam. One almond is hidden in the pudding. Whoever finds the almond is believed to be blessed with luck for the next year. After the meal, Father Christmas visits leaving presents. Christmas Day is generally quiet and the following day, called Boxing Day, continues the holiday with families doing outdoor activities such as skiing and skating. All around the world and among all people, Christmas is a celebration which challenges and calls human beings to live out their higher purpose — to increase kindness, to love mercy, to experience joy, and to cultivate peace.

No matter where you live, or where you are from, or what traditions you follow, the meaning of Christmas is the same all over the world. The true meaning of Christmas—the Good News—is that God has sent his only Son to Earth to save people from their sins. Christmas is not a myth, not a tradition, not a dream — it is a glorious reality. Merry Christmas!!

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

The Father Michael J. McGivney Guild promotes the cause for sainthood of the founder of the Knights of Columbus, who was beatified on Oct. 31, 2020. Members of the Guild, and anyone devoted to Father McGivney, can play an active role in the cause by praying for his intercession in times of need, especially in cases of serious illness, and reporting to the Guild any favors received.

Membership in the Guild is free and open to anyone who is devoted to Father McGivney and wishes to invoke his intercession and assist in his sainthood cause through prayer. Members receive a quarterly newsletter and are remembered in a weekly Mass offered for their intentions.

Catholic men who wish to live out the vision and mission of Father McGivney are invited to join the Knights of Columbus and become part of a network of charity, unity and fraternity that serves local parishes and communities. Father McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus in 1882 in New Haven, Conn., and died at the age of 38 in 1890. His cause for sainthood was opened in 1997, and his heroic virtue was recognized by the Vatican in March 2008, when he was declared a Venerable Servant of God by Pope Benedict XVI.

On May 26, 2020, Father McGivney took another step toward sainthood when Pope Francis approved the promulgation of a decree recognizing a miracle attributed to his intercession. With the approval of this miracle, he was beatified on Oct. 31, 2020, with the title of Blessed.

Another miracle through his intercession is needed for him to be canonized as a saint.

Those devoted to Father McGivney are encouraged to recite regularly the prayer for his canonization, which is available online and on a special prayer card. You may Report favors through this website or by email or regular mail at the addresses listed below.
